# SCC'S NURSING PROGRAM RECEIVED \$150,000 FROM THE MISSOURI STATE BOARD OF NURSING

SCC is among 14 colleges and universities to receive a grant through the Nursing Education Incentive Program, designed to increase the physical and educational capacity of professional nursing programs in the state. SCC will use the grant funds to add a simulation technician position and the necessary technology to expand clinical placements in specialties such as pediatric nursing and support higher student enrollment.



# SCC PARTICIPATES IN STUDY FOR NCHEMS

Representatives from SCC, along with other colleges and universities in the state, participated in an extensive study related to a potential new funding model for higher education in Missouri. The Missouri Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development (MDHEWD) contracted with the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems (NCHEMS), to make recommendations for a new funding model and for improving efficiency and effectiveness in the delivery of public higher education in Missouri.



### MEGATECH STUDENTS MODIFY TOYS TO HELP KIDS

tudents from the pilot year of the MegaTech program delivered toys, which they adapted as part of their class, to the St. Louis Children's Specialty Care Center. The toys will be distributed to young patients with developing motor skills.

MegaTech introduces dual-enrolled high school students to advanced manufacturing and mechatronics. The program also addresses workforce needs and gives students a pathway to start their education at SCC.

As a service-learning component to the class, working with Switched Adaptive Toys brought meaning to concepts they are learning in class, like electrical/electronics, soldering, engineering, lean manufacturing and problem solving.


