Monica Hall-Woods, Ph.D., Professor of Biology (center), received the President's Pinnacle of Excellence Award. This award is reserved for faculty and staff who consistently demonstrate performance excellence throughout their careers at St. Charles Community College. President Kavalier recognized Hall-Woods for her extraordinary efforts to keep students engaged in their

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courses, exhibited by her efforts during the pandemic, when she dressed as unicorn, Darth Vader, Guy Fieri, and others. Most recently she spent her semester on sabbatical developing a 15-week lab curriculum that studies the relationship between dog sociability and genetics and invited students and employees to bring their dogs to campus.

Jennie Fuentes, Director of External Programs and Operations, received the college Innovator of the Year Award. This award recognizes an employee who has demonstrated exceptional creativity and problem solving and who has



contributed to increased revenue and resources. Jennie was recognized for her skillful organization and integration of various components of the Health Occupations program into cohesive student and community initiatives. Through her proactive and creative approach, she developed new programs that address challenges and significantly enhance the efficiency and impact of our programs. Her ability to bring diverse elements together has led to streamlined operations and improved outcomes.

Dayu Wang, Assistant Professor of Computer Science, received the Excellence in Teaching Award, sponsored by Emerson. This is a regional award that honors outstanding faculty in secondary and higher education. Dayu's teaching philosophy is rooted in the belief that education should be practical, inclusive, and transformative. He seeks to equip students with the skills they need to succeed in the rapidly evolving world of computer science while fostering an environment that supports diverse learning styles and backgrounds.

In the first round the Cougars (seeded #12 out of 12) pulled off an upset of the #8 seeded Scottsdale Community College (2-1). In the second round they took the #1-ranked team Northwest Mississippi to double overtime, but lost in the last minutes of the match 1-0.

In addition to this second run at the national title, the team is the back-to-back 2023 and 2024 Region 16 Conference Champions and the NJCAA Central District Champions. They finished their season with 16 wins, 2 losses, and 2 ties.

Giulia Starman and Sandra Swartz were named to 1st Team All Region and Gabby Starman was named to 2nd Team All Region.
